Staff Sergeant Kevin M. Amrein graduated from Star Valley High School, Star Valley, WY (1990). He attended the following military service schools: Basic Electronics Maintenance Course (2013); Ground Radar Repair (2013); Common Logistics Command & Control Systems Operator Course (2015); Blue Force Tracker Joint Battle Command Platform Operators Course (2015); Corporals Course Resident (2016); Sergeants Course Resident (2018); Advanced Electronics Maintenance Course (2020); Electronics Maintenance Technician Course (2020); SNCO Career Course (2021).

Throughout the period January 2022 through December 2022, Staff Sergeant Amrein served with extreme distinction as the Information Maintenance Chief for Amphibious Task Force 51 / 5th Marine Expeditionary Brigade. He repeatedly displayed a level of technical acumen that far exceeds what is expected from a Marine of his rank and time in service. His attention to detail, incredible versatility, and forward-thinking attitude greatly enhanced the capabilities of Task Force 51/5.
